



The recovery, which started in 2010, has been uneven across the state. Conditions have improved for some families, but with rising costs, many still find themselves struggling.

## Households by Income, 2010 to 2016







## Households by Income, 2010 to 2016














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
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### Households by Income, 2010 to 2016

### Households by Income, 2010 to 2016









#### Households by Income, 2010 to 2016











#### Households by Income, 2010 to 2016









#### Households by Income, 2010 to 2016

















#### Households by Income, 2010 to 2016






